



3 Steps to Studying the Bible

- 1. Observation What does the passage say?
- 2. Interpretation What does the passage mean?
- 3. Application Who is God calling me to be? What is God calling me to do?

Observation

- · Who/what/where/when?
- · Key words/phrases
- · Ideas/concepts
- · Genre: Poetry, narrative, epistle, etc.

Interpretation

- · "A text cannot mean now what it couldn't mean then."
- Context
- · Cross references Use scripture to interpret scripture
- · Culture

Application

- · What does the passage say about my relationship with God? With others? With myself?
- ·How does this passage change/challenge/inspire the way I think?
- · What I should I do or become?
